 Historically, Protestant Christianity has been the dominant religious influence in white American culture Religious Expression Emphasis on individual spiritual journey rather than communal religious experience Separation of religious and secular life Private rather than public expressions of faith Emotional restraint in worship Weekly church attendance as a social norm (though declining in recent decades) 	 Beyond traditional religious practices, white American culture has developed a distinct civic religion that combines: Reverence for national symbols (flag, anthem, pledge of allegiance) Belief in American exceptionalism Celebration of civic holidays as quasi- religious occasions (July 4th, Memorial Day) Veneration of founding fathers and historical documents (Constitution, Declaration of Independence) 	 Nuclear family as the ideal unit (parents and children living separately from extended family) Emphasis on independence - children expected to move out and establish separate households in early adulthood Focus on self-reliance Scheduled family time and structured activities Privacy and personal space highly valued, including separate bedrooms for children when possible Parenting styles typically feature: Emphasis on children developing independence early Structured routines and schedules Communication that encourages children to make their own decisions Family relationships often prioritize: Nuclear family bonds over extended family connections Individual autonomy within the family unit Scheduled visits and planned interactions with extended family

 Casual, practical clothing with emphasis on comfort and modesty Business attire tends toward conservative styles and neutral colors 	 Assuming white cultural norms and practices are universally "American" rather than culturally specific Defining what's "normal" 	

- Seasonal wardrobe changes reflecting weather and social occasions
- Hair typically worn in natural state or with minimal styling
- Men's hairstyles tend toward short, low-maintenance cuts, with facial hair ranging from clean shaven to wellgroomed beards being equally acceptable
- Unconsciously and/or consciously accepting and feeling more comfortable with predominantly white leadership structures
- Normalized anti-Blackness
 - Anti-Blackness is a prominent ideaology present by early childhood
